# **Course Description**

Role of aquaculture, beef cattle, dairy cattle, goats, horses, poultry, sheep and swine in serving humans. Introduction to nutrition, growth, reproduction, meats, genetics, behavior and welfare related to improving livestock production.

- 6. To develop an appreciation of the various livestock industries.
