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DESCRIPTION

This course provides students the opportunity to prepare and present an engaging and informative research seminar. Additionally students will be expected to attend all other seminars and participate with questions and discussion.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students will be able to critically read and interpret scientific articles, be informed of recent research developments in reproductive biology, and present a 45 minute seminar to a reproductive biology audience and address questions appropriately.

Enrollment in graduate school. Enrollment must be approved by Dr Bromfield to ensure a place on the seminar schedule. Students are encouraged to contact Dr Bromfield early (prior to the start of the semester).
