Course Objective

To understand the principles of animal breeding and genetics and their application in the improvement of animals.

Credits: 3

Course Prerequisites

ANS3006 and BSC2011 and BSC2011L or equivalents. Students are expected to have a coherent foundation knowledge in biology, such as cell structure and function, biological molecules, cellular process, ecology, and evolution.

Course Description

Basic principles of Mendelian, Population and Quantitative Genetics as applied to improvement of domestic animals. Selection, inbreeding and crossbreeding strategies for genetic improvement of livestock.

Course Objectives

To understand the principles of animal breeding and genetics and their application in the improvement of animals.

By the end of the semester, the student should be able to:

- 1. Be familiar with the principles of Mendelian inheritance
- 2. Understand the principles of recombination, mutation, selection, and non-random mating as they apply to the inheritance of simple traits and their effect on populations
- 3. Comprehend the different breeding approaches for simple and polygenic traits
- 4. Understand the genetic model for quantitative traits
- 5. Apply statistics to the characterization of quantitative traits and genetic prediction
- 6. Understand the nature and use of heritability and repeatability
- 7. Comprehend the factors affecting the rate of genetic change
- 8. Be familiar with the mechanisms of large-scale genetic evaluation
- 9. Be familiar with mating systems and mating strategies
- 10. Understand the concept of hybrid vigor as it relates to systems of crossbreeding
- 11. Recognize applications of biotechnology to animal breeding

Text

No formal text is required. Students will be provided handouts, which are current and relevant to topics discussed in class. Optional references include:

Course organization

The course is organized in weekly Modules in Canvas. Each weekly Module will open **Tuesday 7 am**. Lecture handouts will be provided for each lecture in Canvas, and a printed copy will be provided in class to help follow along and take notes.

Lecture Questions

Following each lecture, you will have to review the covered material and formulate 1 question with the correct answer. Each question plus answer set is worth 4 points. To receive full credit, the question and its correct answer have to be posted on time in Canvas. They will be due **the next day at 9 am.** Use proper sentence structure, grammar, etc. will be considered in grading. Formulate questions you would not mind seeing on the quiz or exam. Once you post your questions, you will have access to everyone's questions/answers. They can be used as a Study Guide for the quizzes and exams.

Quizzes

There will be 14 quizzes worth 10 points each. The quizzes will be available online in Canvas and will be taken online – they will be due **Friday before 9 am**. They will consist of short questions: multiple choice, true/false, fill in the blank or short answer, from the lectures covered that particular week. Each quiz will be made available on **Thursday after class** and will remain open until Friday morning. However, you will have a limited time to take it once you start the quiz (10 minutes) – so it is important that you study the lectures before you start to take the quiz. Please try to take these quizzes before Friday and make sure you have a secure internet connection (if you lose the internet connection your quiz will end, and you will not be allowed to take it again). Quizzes are set up to be graded automatically, and, especially for short-answer type of questions, your answer is very likely to be slightly different than the correct one and the question will be counted wrong. We will re-grade quizzes manually, but we will do it when all quizzes are in, after the due day/time. Please wait until **5 pm Monday** after the deadline and if you still have questions about your grade then feel free to contact me.

Laboratory periods

The Friday periods constitute a two-hour laboratory. There will be 8 problem sets worth 20 points each to be completed during the laboratory period. The **Problem Set** will be handed out on Friday and the bulk of the work on problem sets should be accomplished during the laboratory period. A **Practice Problem** set will be first discussed and instructions on how problems are to be approached and solved will be provided in this first part of the laboratory. Students will be allowed to work on the Problem set in groups, and the instructor and TAs will be available for questions and guidance. The completed Problem Sets could be **handed out at the end of the laboratory period on Friday or uploaded in Canvas before 5 pm the following Monday.** Note that incomplete or incorrect problem sets will be graded accordingly, and no resubmissions will be accepted.

Self-guided Practice Problems

There will be 1 self-guided practice problem worth 20 points for week 9. The Self-guided Practice Problem set will be made available online in Canvas on Thursday after class and will remain open for uploading completed Practice Problems in Canvas until **5 pm the following Monday**.

In-class Exams

There will be 4 in-class exams worth 100 points each. The material covered in each exam will be detailed prior to each exam (*see important dates*). The final exam is in-class, optional and comprehensive and worths 100 points.

Bonus (extra) Credits

You may earn a maximum of 50 bonus points in this category. These points will be derived from unannounced short quizzes during lectures and other opportunities to award extra points as appropriate. To receive bonus points, students must attend for the entire lecture. There will be no "make-up" for extra credit.

The iClicker system will be used in this class for in-class bonus questions. You can use iClicker Reef or iClicker remotes. It is your responsibility to follow the steps below to properly get added to my iClicker course and/or register your iClicker remote in a timely fashion. It is also your responsibility to regularly check your iClicker records for any discrepancies and bring them to my attention within 72 h. You must create an iClicker student

app account by downloading the mobile app via the App Store or Google Play, or by visiting the <u>iClicker student web</u> app to ensure grades appear in Canvas gradebook. <u>Please ask questions in class</u> and do not be apprehensive about concepts that might not be clear. It is important to keep up and not fall behind. Get started on the first day of class – do your homework on time – attend class – get help when you need it – and remember there is no substitute for DAILY PREPARATION. <u>It is much easier on all of us if you get answers to questions one or two days after class rather than one or two days before an exam.</u>

Your final grade will be calculated using your **top three in-class exam scores**, dropping your lowest score. **This policy allows you to drop one exam for whatever reason without penalty**. Reasons for dropping an exam include poor performance, absence, sickness, personal or family reasons, work, other academic conflicts, such as other exams, participation in club activities, or any other extracurricular activities, or other unforeseen circumstances.

*** THERE WILL BE NO MAKE-UP EXAMS. This is the reason why you are allowed to drop one exam. If you miss two exams, you can take the optional comprehensive final exam to compensate.

Comprehensive final exam: It is **optional** and can be used to improve your grade by replacing the second lowest in-class exam grade. However, **if you decide to take it, it will count and will automatically eliminate your second lowest in-class exam score**.

<u>Example</u>: A student scored: exam 1 = 80, exam 2 = 0, exam 3 = 75, exam 4 = 70. Dropping the lowest score (0), their in-class exam grade would be 80+75+70 = 225. If the student decided to take the optional comprehensive final exam and score 60, their second lowest score (70) is eliminated, and their new in-class exam grade will be calculated as 80+75+60 = 215.

Therefore, if you decide to take the optional comprehensive final exam, <u>your grade will be</u> <u>recalculated accordingly</u>. My advice? Aim to perform well throughout the semester, so you can focus on other classes that require finals without added stress of another final.

Polite and professional emails are expected. You may refer to me as Dr. Rezende or Professor Rezende. Emails are typically answered within 2 weekdays; however, during hectic times, such as beginning and end of the semester and around exams, it may take me longer to get back to you due to the greater volume of emails. Policy on Late Assignments

Lecture questions are due the **day after each lecture by 9am**. Quizzes are due on **Friday by 9am**. Lab exercises and self-guided problem are due on **Monday by 5 pm**. They may be handed in late (with no penalty) **only** if it is arranged with the instructor. Otherwise, there will be a **2-points penalty per day** for lecture questions, and **4-point penalty per day** for quizzes and problem sets.

All formulas necessary for the completion of an exam will be provided with the exam. Students are not required to memorize these formulas, but it is important to know which formula to use and how to use them.
