### ANS 6932 - Graduate Seminar in Animal Genetics and Genomics

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### **DESCRIPTION:**

This course provides graduate students the opportunity to gain experience in preparing and presenting a research seminar, as well as to be exposed to current research in the field of animal genetics and genomics, including topics such as (i) genome-wide association studies, (ii) genomic selection and prediction of complex traits, (iii) gene-set and pathway analysis, (iv) population genetics and genomics, (v) statistical methods, computational and bioinformatic tools for genetic/genomic analysis, and (vi) opportunities and challenges for future animal geneticists.

# **COURSE FORMAT:**

Course consists of a weekly 1-hour seminar.

### TIME & PLACE:

Tuesdays at 4:05PM (8<sup>th</sup> period) at ANS Dept. Bldg. 459 Room 102.

# **EXPECTED OUTCOMES:**

Students are required to present a 45-minute seminar to the group once during the semester. Students are expected to engage in seminars by asking questions and providing informative comments. Active participation and critical evaluation of seminars presentations will facilitate build scientific communication skills, learn how to engage a scientific audience, and develop scientific rigor.

### **REQUIREMENTS:**

Enrollment in graduate school.

### **GRADING POLICY:**

S/U, grading based on attendance (30%) and presentation (70%). The highest possible grade for a student missing two seminars is B+ and, for a student missing three lectures, is a B. Any student missing four or more lectures will be given an unsatisfactory (U) grade.
